Principal: Mr. Johnson – The Windom Musical took place on February 7th & 8th with the new sound system in place. Tickets for a chance to win front row seats, bottles of water, and carnations were sold to help raise funds for the musical budget. The Windom-Haiti Partnership raffled five pieces of original Haitian art to raise money for a lunch program (for non-consumables such as bowls, and the salary of a chef) at the New Birth School, our partner school there. Additional fundraisers are being considered, including a rubber bracelet sale and a drop-your-kids-off night. Through a grant via the OPFAE, Windom will receive a "Book Vending Machine" where students can redeem earned tokens based on their acts of kindness. The vending machine includes 200 tokens and customizable shelving for various book sizes. Proposed funding for the books would ideally come via the PTO, book fair donations, and/or building funds. The machine is expected to be in before the end of the current school year. "Mission in Vision" is a Shared Decision Making (SDM) Committee initiative to create a new Windom mission statement. The SDM Committee will be reaching out to the parent community to get feedback on positive buzzwords that summarize what their child has gained by attending Windom. Some of the before & after-school clubs require a few additional materials as part of their experience. Given current policies that are in place, there was discussion on how we might be able to secure funds in order to purchase consumable items that the kids might receive. Lastly, for the first time in about 10 years there will be a relocation drill at Windom on May 9th at 9:30 a.m. This means that staff will evacuate the building for a period of time.

Teacher: Mrs. Lew reporting – Windom's Author Visit will take place from March 12-13, 2019 when we will welcome NYT bestselling author Susan Verde. An order form and letter went home regarding this event. Book orders are due by Feb. 13th. Mrs. Artmeier was looking for a ticket sales helper during the Windom Musical. The Kindergarten teachers thanked the PTO for Mr. Morton visits. Parent Volunteers are requested for Girls on the Run – visit the Virtual Backpack for more information. The PTO will once again be sponsoring the KONA Ice Truck during the 5th grade field day in June.

PTO Updates

Family Skate Night – About 150 people attended this annual event and everyone had fun.

Box Tops Contest – Our goal this year was to earn \$1500 (15,000 box tops), and we earned approximately \$1347 (13,471). This was down about 15% from last year even though reminders were sent out throughout the year. Thank you to everyone who submitted their box tops and to those who signed up to count them. UPK Registration begins Wednesday, January 2, 2019.

- Children must turn 4 years old by December 1, 2019 in order to be eligible to register for UPK.
- To make an appointment to register your child for the UPK Program, please call Amanda Alba, Central Registrar at 716-209-6325.
- There is limited availability for the UPK program based on grant funding. If more children apply than there are available slots, the district will hold a random selection lottery. This has been the case for the past three years.
- The Orchard Park Central School District partners with local preschool providers for this program. Due to capacity limitations, the program is not housed in our elementary buildings.
- Registration must be completed by Friday, March 29, 2019 in order to be eligible for inclusion in the UPK lottery. The registration forms may be downloaded from the district's website (www.opschools.org/upk) or mailed to you upon request.





Community News - Head Lice



Head lice can be a frequent occurrence, particularly in elementary schools. Head lice is a rapidly growing problem that has no reflection on one's own cleanliness, social or economic situation. Head lice are defined as parasitic insects that can be found on the head and are characterized by itching of the scalp as a result of live lice in the hair or ova (nits) attached to the hair shaft. The adult is a flat wing-less creature with six legs and a stubby antenna. Lice do not hop, jump or fly. The eggs they lay are called nits. The nits

attach to the hair shaft and are very difficult to remove as they manufacture their own glue-like substance to hold themselves to the hair shaft. The most common symptom is the persistent itching. Children scratch behind their ears and at the base of their neck. Head lice are not contagious, are not known to spread illness, nor are they life threatening or due to poor hygiene. Rather, head lice are spread through the sharing of hats, combs, brushes or by direct contact with the hair of an infested person. Head lice feet are specially adapted for holding onto human hair. Head lice would have difficulty attaching to smooth or slippery surfaces like plastic, metal, polished synthetic leathers & other similar materials.

If a case is reported in a classroom, all parents in that class will be informed.

What can you do?

- We ask you to check your child's head, nape of the neck and behind the ears for live lice or nits (lice eggs) on a weekly basis. Do the same for siblings and anyone else in the home. See your physician to confirm any suspicions you may have about what you find.
- Immediately report any confirmed diagnosis found at home to your school nurse.
- Consult with your pharmacist or physician to choose the right product for treatment. Carefully read the directions for application and re-treatment.
- Remind your children not to share personal items such as combs, brushes, hats with one another.
- Check the OPCSD homepage (www.opschools.org), type the word lice in site search for more information.

Dear Parent or Guardian,

Dear Parents and /or Guardians:

The purpose of this letter is to inform you of an important change in the immunization requirements for students entering sixth grade. Effective September 1, 2007 a New York State Public Health Law amendment requires students born on or after January 1, 1994 and those entering the 6th grade on or after September 2007 must receive a Tdap booster immunization. Tdap is the tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis vaccine.

Written documentation of this booster immunization must be provided by your physician's office. Please note that in accordance with New York State Public Health Law/ Education Law your child may be excluded from attending school if immunization requirements are not met.

Please...

- Call your child's doctor with any questions and to schedule an appointment for the Tdap booster

- Forward written documentation to school health office no later than June 15th

-If you are unable to complete immunization requirements by June 15th submit date of scheduled appointment student will receive this booster

It should be noted that school health personnel are not available during the summer months to receive this information. Your prompt attention and cooperation are greatly appreciated. Please do not hesitate to contact your school nurse for questions or concerns.

Reminder to all parents and guardians of students at Windom re: "Food Allergy Classrooms":

In order to keep our students with food allergies safe, we ask that you refrain from sending in any homemade treats or items bought from a bakery into classrooms for special occasions. We also ask that you refrain from bringing in any type of food into any common areas of the school other than the cafeteria. We cannot guarantee the safety of these homemade or bakery food items as cross-contamination may pose a risk. If your child is in a "Food Allergy Classroom", you were informed over the summer with a letter from the principal and Health Office. Food allergies can be life-threatening and we are all responsible to keep students safe in schools.

If you would like to send in a treat to the classroom for your child on a **special occasion only**, please make sure that the snack is store bought and pre-packaged from a safe snack list with the proper labeling/ ingredient list.

A safe snack list is available for your reference from Mrs. Johnson (School Nurse) and at <u>http://</u><u>snacksafely.com/safe-snack-guide/</u>. Please keep in mind that this is a safe snack list primarily for peanuts/tree nut, dairy, egg and sesame allergies. If your child is in a classroom with any other type of food allergies, please contact your child's teacher or the School Nurse for reference. Always check the label for possible cross-contamination.

If you have any questions, please contact Mrs. Johnson in the Health Office and she can provide you with safe snack ideas.

Thank you for your cooperation in this effort to keep all of our students here at Windom safe, happy, and healthy!

Important News for Schools and Child-Care Facilities

What: Pursuant to New York State Public Health Law (PHL) § 613, schools and child-care settings are required to post influenza educational material, in plain view, within their facilities. Information must be posted starting now. Influenza season begins in early fall and can last through May.

Outreach to parents and guardians of children ages 6 months to 18 years must be directed to those whose children attend:

- Licensed and registered day-care programs
- Nursery schools
- Prekindergarten
- Kindergarten
- School-age child-care programs
- Public schools
- Nonpublic schools
- **Purpose:** To ensure that families of these children receive information on influenza and the benefits of influenza immunizations in connection with efforts to raise the immunity of children against influenza.

The New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) would like you to know that information regarding influenza and the benefits of influenza immunizations is free, accessible and available in different languages from several organizations:

Keep your kids safe. Get their flu vaccine every year. The Flu: A Guide for Parents

Is the flu more serious for kids?	Infants and young children are at greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu. That's why the New York State Department of Health recommends that all children 6 months and older get the flu vaccine.
Flu vaccine may save your child's life.	Most people with the flu are sick for about a week, and then they feel better. But, some people, especially young children, pregnant women, older people, and people with chronic health problems can get very sick. Some can even die. An annual vaccine is the best way to protect your child from the flu. The vaccine is recommended for everyone 6 months and older every year.
What is the flu?	The flu, or influenza, is an infection of the nose, throat, and lungs. The flu can spread from person to person.
Who needs the flu vaccine?	 Flu vaccine can be given to children 6 months and older. Children younger than 9 years old who get a vaccine for the first time need two doses.
How else can I protect my child?	 Get the flu vaccine yourself. Encourage your child's close contacts to get the flu vaccine, too. This is very important if your child is younger than 5, or if he or she has a chronic health problem such as asthma (breathing disease) or diabetes (high blood sugar levels). Because children under 6 months can't be vaccinated, they rely on those around them to get an annual flu vaccine. Wash your hands often and cover your coughs and sneezes. It's best to use a tissue and quickly throw it away. If you don't have a tissue, cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve, not your hands. This will prevent the spread of germs. Tell your children to: Stay away from people who are sick; Clean their hands often; Keep their hands away from their face; and Cover coughs and sneezes to protect others.
What are signs of the flu?	The flu comes on suddenly. Most people with the flu feel very tired and have a high fever, headache, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, and sore muscles. Some people, especially children, may also have stomach problems and diarrhea. The cough can last two or more weeks.

How does the flu spread?	People who have the flu usually cough, sneeze, and have a runny nose. The droplets in a cough, sneeze or runny nose contain the flu virus. Other people can get the flu by breathing in these droplets or by getting them in their nose or mouth.
How long can a sick person spread the flu to others?	Most healthy adults may be able to spread the flu from one day before getting sick to up to 5 days after getting sick. This can be longer in children and in people who don't fight disease as well (people with weaker immune systems).
What should I use to clean hands?	Wash your children's hands with soap and water. Wash them for as long as it takes to sing the "Happy Birthday" song twice. If soap and water are not handy, use a hand sanitizer. It should be rubbed into hands until the hands are dry.
What can I do if my child gets sick?	 Make sure your child gets plenty of rest and drinks lots of fluids. Talk with your child's health care provider before giving your child over-the-counter medicine. Never give your child or teen aspirin, or medicine that has aspirin in it. It can cause serious problems. Call your child's health care provider if your child develops flu symptoms and is younger than 5 or has a chronic medical condition like asthma, diabetes, or heart or lung disease. If you are worried about your child's illness, call your health care provider.
Can my child go to school or day care with the flu?	No. If your child has the flu, he or she should stay home to rest. This helps avoid giving the flu to other children.
When can my child go back to school or day care after having the flu?	Children with the flu should be isolated in the home, away from other people. They should also stay home until they have no fever without the use of fever-control medicines and they feel well for 24 hours. Remind your child to protect others by covering his or her mouth when coughing or sneezing. You may want to send your child to school with some tissues, and a hand sanitizer, if allowed by the school.
