Compound Verbs

A compound verb is composed of two or more separate verbs (including auxiliary verbs) that have the same subject. If there are two (or more) verbs in the sentence and each have a separate subject and express a complete thought, then it is a compound sentence, not a compound verb.

Example: I <u>hired</u> Ms. Fisher and <u>fired</u> Ms. Crocker. (compound verb)

The puppy <u>rolled</u> in the mud and <u>needed</u> a bath. (compound verb)

Jack <u>felt</u> rather queasy, and Jane <u>looked</u> really pale. (compound sentence.)
